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# BEYOND 20/20: RESETTING THE GOALS

### Dear Seva Canada Supporters,

When Vision 2020 was launched in 1999 by the International Agency for the Prevention of Blindness (IAPB), its goal was 'a world in which nobody is needlessly visually impaired, where those with unavoidable vision loss can achieve their full potential. This global initiative both intensified and accelerated prevention of blindness activities worldwide and resulted in enormous gains in treatment, training and research. We haven't yet eliminated preventable and treatable blindness, but we've made enormous progress.

With the publication of the first World Health Organization World Report on Vision in late 2019, eye care organizations acknowledged that there are significant challenges to meeting current and projected eye care needs worldwide.

### What will Seva Canada do to narrow the gap?

We will continue to ensure that the people and communities we serve are equal partners in planning, developing and monitoring their eye care programs.



We will continue to advocate for a focus on strong and affordable primary eye care, based in the community.

We will continue to produce and support health systems research to create successful and cost-effective eye care interventions.

And, we will work with governments and national health systems to include eye care in healthcare strategic plans.

None of this is new for Seva Canada. A 'people centered approach' that empowers communities as decision makers is how we have worked since 1982 and how we will continue to work. As our founders still say "it's all done with people".

### Simon Arunga, MD, PhD

Simon Arunga is a 36-year-old Ugandan ophthalmologist. He is married to a fellow doctor, Viola, and they have a young son. Simon is the president of the Ophthalmology Society of Uganda, Editor-in Chief of the Journal of Ophthalmology for Eastern Central and Southern Africa (JOECSA), IAPB Eye Health Hero 2019 and Volk Visionary award winner, April 2020.

Simon trained as a general doctor at Mbarara University of Science and Technology (MUST) in Southern Uganda. In 2013, he graduated as an ophthalmologist. He continues to work at MUST as a clinical lecturer in the Department of Ophthalmology. His work involves patient management including ophthalmic surgery, coordination of the ophthalmology training program at MUST and research.

Simon completed his PhD in 2019 at the prestigious London School of Hygiene & Tropical Medicine, London UK. His research focused on epidemiology of corneal infections in Uganda, which is a frequent, severe cause of sight loss. Simon continues to work as a post-doctoral research fellow at the London School of Hygiene & Tropical Medicine, exploring new approaches to treating corneal infections in Uganda.

Simon is a passionate social entrepreneur who has successfully created Community Eye Care Centres (CECs) in Uganda supported by a grant from Seva Canada. He has an ambitious plan to establish one CEC in every town in Southwestern Uganda to provide first-line comprehensive eye care to a population of over 8 million people. **His approach to life is "changing the world, one eye at a time".** 



#### Peter Kileo

Peter Kileo is the Program Coordinator and Assistant Director at the Kilimanjaro Center for Community Ophthalmology (KCCO, Tanzania). Before joining KCCO in January 2014, Peter worked with missionaries as a high school tutor.

Peter holds a BA in Philosophy from Urbanianna University, Rome, Italy, a Postgraduate Diploma in Community Development, and a Master's Degree in Cooperative and Community Development from Sokoine University of Agriculture, Morogoro, Tanzania.

When he joined the KCCO in 2014, Peter was introduced into the ophthalmic world through various training programs related to the management of community ophthalmology programs at the Lions Aravind Institute of Community

Ophthalmology (LAICO), the training and consulting arm of Aravind Eye Care System in Southern India, and at the Blantyre Institute of Community Ophthalmology in Malawi, and at the University of Cape Town, South Africa.

Peter has a strong interest in research related to the management of community ophthalmology programs and is very involved in monitoring, evaluation and program mentorship.

Peter Kileo lives in Moshi, a small beautiful town at the foot of Mt Kilimanjaro, where he is married to his wife Agnes. Together they have a family of three children, Philbert age 8, Damin 4, and Arriela who is 1 year old.

## WORLD SIGHT DAY 2020: HOPE IN SIGHT

World Sight Day, the annual day of awareness to focus global attention on blindness and vision impairment, will be held on October 8, 2020. This year's global theme is Hope in Sight.

At least 2.2 billion people around the world are currently living with visual impairment, and at least 1 billion of those cases could have been prevented or have yet to be addressed. Additionally, it is estimated that by 2050, myopia or nearsightedness will affect half of the world's population.

No one should live with treatable visual impairment or blindness simply because they do not have or cannot access services. On World Sight Day, let's make our voices heard and advocate for eye care for all!

# SEVA CANADA IS AMONG THE BEST CHARITIES IN CANADA

We are both delighted and honoured to be named one of the Absolute Top 99.5 Percentile Charities in Canada by Circle Acts. The **Circle Acts Canada High Impact 400 charity list** is managed by the Circle Acts Charity. The number 400 represents the top 99.5 percentile of all CRA registered charities in Canada, and the high-impact 400 represents the top 0.05% charities.

The list only includes charities that demonstrate impactcentric and transparency in their charitable operations based on a rating methodology which consists of qualitative and quantitative information.

Out of 85,000 charities registered with the Canadian Revenue Agency, we are one of only 270 organizations that made Circle Acts list as of June 2020!



Circle Acts' objective is to help donors filter out lower-impact charities and recommend those they believe bring impact. They do not compare causes to determine which ones are more important vs less important. They evaluate all charities in the same manner regardless of whether they are internationally-focused or local, scientific research-based or an art-focused charity. They just have one goal — which charities are bringing high-impact?

# PROVIDING EYE CARE IN THE COVID-19 WORLD

Most eye care programs in most countries where Seva works stopped providing all services, other than emergencies, in late February or early March this year following strict government decrees in Asian countries (China, Cambodia, Nepal and India) as well as some countries in Africa (Madagascar and Uganda) but other programs stopped services despite receiving no government direction (Tanzania).



With the hospitals only providing emergency services and most employees continuing to receive salaries, several opportunities arose for individual and collective program evaluation and learning. In Nepal, for example, a virtual multi-centre cataract surgical quality improvement program involving 5 hospitals became more active,



with a focus on COVID-19 infection control in hospital. An operational research capacity building program, involving the Indian Institute for Public Health in Hyderabad, expanded to assist programs in India, Nepal and Cambodia.

While police-enforced shut down rules have been followed successfully, lifting these rules likely will be problematic in most settings where Seva Canada operates. Typically, in these areas, people have a low level of trust in the government, do not recognize the importance of the health system, and have little or no experience with public health measures.

In any case, providing eye care in a less efficient and more cautious COVID world likely means adding about 20% to the cost of services at any program level. Programs are currently running at 50% capacity in most settings.

As eye care in the COVID world evolves, our partners and programs will continue to find safe and effective ways to give the power of sight to those in need.

# OVERCOMING BARRIERS TO EYE CARE IN CAMBODIA



EYE HEALTH AWARENESS SESSION (EHAS) PARTICIPANTS

Despite government hospitals in Cambodia expanding and improving their ophthalmology units in terms of equipment, training and service quality, almost all facilities remain grossly under-utilized. The reasons for low utilization include low literacy particularly among women, little disposable income available for healthcare, difficult travel, and profound distrust and fear of government programs. Women face additional barriers due to their low socio-economic status in the family and they are often unaware of eye care services that are available free of cost.

In the fall of 2018, Seva Cambodia hired Sophon to provide Eye Health Awareness Sessions (EHAS) to influential people in the communities such as village leaders, school principals and teachers, and religious leaders, about the causes of blindness, prevention, treatment and services available at the nearest eye care facility.

Strategies were developed to overcome the main barriers: fear of cost, fear of surgery, use of traditional medicine, and lack of a caretaker.

The EHAS program has proven remarkably successful in all four provinces supported by Seva Cambodia, more than doubling the number of people (60% women) visiting screening camps and going on to have cataract surgery!

# A GIFT THAT WILL TRANSFORM KIDS' LIVES IN NEPAL AND AFRICA FOR YEARS TO COME!


Seva Canada received a transformative gift from Mae Runions Pratt-Johnson to honour her late husband, Dr. John Pratt-Johnson. John was a renowned Canadian pediatric ophthalmologist and Professor of Ophthalmology at the University of British Columbia. As a former Seva Canada board member, John raised funds and trained legions of eye care professionals within Canada and internationally.

We spoke with Mae to discuss John and his international pediatric ophthalmology work.

Mae first met John through a church group in Vancouver and they became close while training for a charity bike ride. During their years together, Mae travelled with John and witnessed the impact of his work. One of their first trips together was to Nepal. During the trip, John was concerned that the doctors and staff at the Lumbini Eye Institute in southern Nepal did not have an exercise facility so he contacted his tennis group and raised enough money to build a simple gym. "By the time we got to Lumbini to discuss plans for the gym the idea had taken on a life of its own with the locals and now included architectural drawings and a second story. The foundation bricks were being laid in a deep hole and John descended the ladder to take part in the Hindu blessings and great celebrations were had," recalled Mae. John then returned home to raise additional funds for the more complex building.

This story demonstrates John's great love for Nepal. When Mae first met John in 2000, he had been travelling back and forth to Nepal with Seva for many years. He was a strong believer in Seva's vision and its model of service to restore sight and prevent blindness. He liked the challenge of being able to make a real difference medically and he loved the warmth of the Nepalese, and the great aptitude and motivation of the young doctors. Plus, an avid athlete and adventurer, John enjoyed exploring the mountains. "I think he had a deep spiritual calling for working in developing countries" said Mae.

John gravitated to pediatrics as he had a natural ease in relating to kids. He practiced medicine in Jamaica before he settled down in Vancouver where he became the first pediatric ophthalmologist in the city in 1966.

Mae's donation will ensure John's pediatric ophthalmology work continues. Over the next five years, this gift will be used to establish training and learning opportunities at the Lumbini Eye Institute in Bhairahawa, and expand the pediatric program at the Bharatpur Eye Hospital. Funds will also be used to support pediatric programs in Madagascar and Burundi.

Seva: How did you become a founder of a contact lens company?

**Kathleen:** It was all a bit serendipitous. I did not envision myself as an entrepreneur when I started the journey. My curiosity and passion just took over!

I have always worn contact lenses. I was used to the hassle of

running out and overpaying for them. During my time off, I started digging into why daily contact lenses were so expensive and discovered that there's really no magic at all. We are a small Canadian company. We believe in transparency, simplicity, and to always give back.

Seva: Why did you decide to support Seva Canada and specifically, our pediatric eye care programs?

*Kathleen:* In creating Dandy, I wanted to create a company that does the right thing by giving back. This was something that I had such a strong connection to that I wanted to do the work personally. Seva Canada was chosen as the partner and they are the perfect fit.

Dandy believes that children should be given the chance to learn and create a generational change in their lives. For some, this is not possible because of poor vision. With a simple pair of eyeglasses, we can help children bring their world into focus and transform their lives.

# A SHY SMILE OF HAPPINESS

Seven-year-old Sandra lives in a rural village in northern Burundi with her parents who support their family through subsistence farming. As a toddler and young child, Sandra's vision began to deteriorate but because she was so young she didn't understand that she was different than other children. When she was 6 years old, her elementary school teacher noticed that she couldn't see the board clearly and notified her parents.

Sandra's parents didn't know what to do. They didn't know if their daughter could be helped and couldn't afford to take her to a doctor. After a year, they heard about a nearby Community Eye Centre, about an hour away, and decided to take Sandra. They weren't sure what to expect because they'd never been to a doctor before but they were willing to try anything to help their daughter.

At the Community Eye Centre, Sandra was diagnosed with a cataract in her left eye and was transported, along with her parents, to the Eye Hospital. At the hospital the ophthalmologist and nurse calmed the worried parents and

explained that they were going to take great care of their daughter and that they would be able to restore her sight, free of charge. Apprehensive but hopeful, Sandra's parents agreed to let the eye care team perform sight-restoring cataract surgery on their daughter.

After Sandra's eye patch was removed the next day and she was provided with a pair of prescription glasses, she smiled shyly as she saw clearly for the first time in years. Sandra's parents were told that a follow up plan would be set up to make sure that Sandra's vision was monitored as she continued to grow.

"She can now see without difficulties and can follow along easily in class! We are so relieved and thankful to everyone who helped her see!" said Sandra's mother.



## SYNERGY COLLABORATIVE HEALTH: CARE. COMFORT. CURE.

Dr. Dave Sinha, founder of Synergy Collaborative Health in Cochrane Alberta, has made an incredibly generous commitment to sponsor a sight-restoring surgery every day and each time a patient accesses a third party aesthetic service at Synergy or an affiliated satellite site.

We had the opportunity to talk with Dr. Sinha to learn why medicine and giving back through Seva Canada was so important to him.

Seva: Can you please tell us a bit about yourself and why you went into medicine?



DR. DAVE SINHA BMED, MD. FCFP, CHT

Dr. Sinha: I am a family physician with a procedural medicine and psychotherapy practice. My wife Swati, is a paediatric hospitalist at the Children's Hospital. We have two dogs and spend a lot our free time walking in beautiful places as a family!

As long as I can remember, medicine has been my inspiration! As I began to consider a profession, there was a desire to do no harm in any way. When I discovered

the physician's core principle to be, 'primum non nocere' meaning 'first, do no harm' – it resonated profoundly. I felt that if the essence of life was love and to serve its singular expression, being a doctor was deeply aligned. Finally, I was looking for a career that could be a means to a greater understanding – of myself, of life, of our existence. In medicine, with its proximity to birth, death, suffering, and healing – the intricacies of science and the breadth of humanity – the universal is ever present, both imminent and transcendent.

### Seva: What is Synergy Collaborative Health and why did you create it?

**Dr. Sinha:** We are an interdisciplinary team of healthcare professionals serving from Cochrane, Alberta. Our collaborative approach is integrative, evidence-based, and most of all – grounded in compassion. At Synergy, we believe that healing, one could say, is as much about tending to the fruit as laying the axe to the root. Our services span the breadth of medicine, from innermost to outermost – from psychotherapy to medical aesthetics.



THE SYNERGY COLLABORATIVE HEALTH TEAM

Our team consists of physicians and surgeons who through medications and procedures address the most gross manifestation of disease. We work with a psychologist and hypnotherapist who shed light on the deeper mental and emotional antecedents, while practitioners with specialized training in Ayurveda, naturopathy or functional nutrition, may address the behaviours and biochemistry from which the condition arose.

Synergy was founded, as I was seeking a space which resonated with what I had experienced and knew within, was the essence of healing. As Mahatma Gandhi said, "be the change you wish to see in the world." This coming together of potential, people and perspectives is the heart of 'Synergy'.

### Seva: Why did you decide to support Seva Canada and specifically sight-restoring surgeries?

**Dr. Sinha:** From the moment I came upon Seva and the work – I was in awe. Seva's vision and mission to eradicate blindness touched me deeply. My wife grew up next to a school for the blind and I knew how devastating a disability it could be for an individual, as well as for a family and community. **Restoring sight, to me, is no less than a miracle.** 

When I learned that there are 36 million people in the world who are blind, and that 4 out of 5 could be cured with a safe and effective procedure – I was inspired. That 5 million people have had their sight restored is a testament to Seva's integrity and the dedication of its volunteers.

Finally, the connection to Dr. Brilliant and Neem Karoli Baba, sealed the deal; confirming that this miracle was something I had to be a part of! This lead to making a commitment to sponsor a sight-restoring surgery every day and each time a patient accessed a third party aesthetic service at Synergy or an affiliated satellite site.

Seva: In learning about eye care in low-income countries what was something that surprised you?

**Dr. Sinha:** I didn't realize that the overwhelming majority of people who were blind in the world could be helped with a simple procedure now rendered accessible through the work of Dr. Venkataswamy.

Most of all, I was surprised that something so life-altering could be achieved with so little. That just \$50 dollars was needed to restore someone's sight and dignity – perhaps ending a lifetime of suffering for a family.

When I think that there are children who may have otherwise lived a lifetime never seeing a sunrise or the faces of those who love them – who may be held back in sharing their gifts with the world – I am ever grateful to Seva and the compassion they share. A service that resonates with our mission at Synergy to, "Care. Comfort. Cure."
