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YOU'RE NEVER TOO YOUNG TO MAKE A DIFFERENCE

In 2012, when 6-year-old Jana in Canada spoke with her grandpa in Rajisthan, India just prior to his cataract surgery, two things happened. First, she learned about cataracts, the "clouds" blocking his vision that only a doctor could remove, and second, she was inspired to help.

"My dad has always taught me from a young age to give back. He's taught me many life lessons not just about other people but about his life. He knows that giving back is the biggest thing you can do. I've been told many times that what you give comes back to you and that really inspired me when I was little."

Jana's father, Anand or "Andy" suggested that she help people who need eye care. "Even though I was really young, I took the initiative because what young kid doesn't want to help people?!" (Jana was clearly not the kind of child that needed to be taught that sharing is caring.)

Starting with a \$500 donation from her dad and a fundraising kit that included a View-master toy that showed pictures of what the world

looked like with cataracts, Jana began raising awareness and soliciting funds at school, in support of Seva Canada. "The View-master helped make people really empathetic to those with cataracts and a lot of people fundraised and supported me back then." Jana and Andy didn't stop there. The fatherdaughter team held a bake sale at her elementary school, raising another \$500. "Together, we embarked on a journey of compassion and service, our hands dusted with flour and our hearts brimming with hope."

When she entered grade 6, Jana was busy with exams, friends and afterschool activities and set aside her fundraising efforts.

Fast-forward to 2022, 16-year-old Jana was going through her old things and reliving memories with her dad when he reminded her of fundraising for Seva Canada. A few of her friends' grandparents had cataracts at the time and, in Jana's words, "I thought I might as well do it again!

There are so many people who can't see and it breaks my heart and I really



just wanted to help them out. People donate food, money, clothes but why not donate sight, that's like the biggest sense you have; without sight we can't really see the world and the world isn't that great a place without it."

In Canada, we have free healthcare so we can get the treatment we need. In India or places in Africa, there's a lot of poverty and most people can't afford eye care. Even if you're middle class in India, there are so many people that there aren't enough doctors to help everyone. Some people have to carry water from place to place on top of taking care of their family, so it's a million times harder not having eyesight. Some people haven't even seen their own child. It's just tragic.

By championing the cause of those deprived of vision care, I aspire to cultivate a legacy of empathy and action, inspiring others to join

hands in illuminating the world with kindness.

If people say 'Oh, I don't have this car or this new phone,' I'll say be blessed you have healthy eyes and can see. One message I'd like to give to every young person—at least try to give \$10 or \$20, whatever you can or if you're old enough and can go out and help other people at least try. Take the initiative and make an effort. Think about not only how you're living but also how your neighbour is living. You never know how people are doing."

Jana is on the way to reaching her fundraising goal of \$5000 to help 100 people see again with cataract surgery. We know Jana will reach not only her fundraising goal but also her career goal of becoming a doctor. Next year, Jana, who has already been accepted to her university of choice, will continue on her journey

of helping people, of doing 'Seva', selfless service.

Dr. Spencer, through years of dedicated service, has collaborated extensively with Seva Foundation and Seva Canada, contributing significantly to humanitarian efforts in Nepal and numerous other countries worldwide. Serving on the board of both organizations, he has prioritized service quality, volume, and program sustainability, embodying the spirit of the Chang-Crandall Humanitarian Award.

Established in 2017, the ASCRS Foundation Chang-Crandall Humanitarian Award recognizes and celebrates exceptional contributions to humanitarian work in the field of cataract blindness and disability. This annual accolade is awarded to individuals or organizations for their charitable accomplishments. The award recipient is formally acknowledged at the ASCRS Annual Meeting, accompanied by a \$100,000 donation in their name to the charitable ophthalmic organization of their choice. Dr. Spencer has earmarked the financial prize to be split between Seva Canada and Seva Foundation efforts to strengthen eye program quality and sustainability.

A Special Tribute to Dr. Marty Spencer From Seva Canada Program Director, Dr. Ken Bassett:



MARTY TRAINING IN THORI. NEPAL

Few people are more revered by eye care providers, particularly ophthalmologists in Asia and Africa, than Dr. Marty Spencer, who has worked humbly and tirelessly to help them to provide high-quality care to the people they serve. His work epitomises international development with dignity, where Dr. Spencer's success is

measured by their success and the growth of their dignity as professionals, long after he has gone home.

In the early 1980s, when the eye care community in most high-income countries argued that the new transformative, intraocular techniques were too expensive for most people India, Marty ignored their advice, got on a plane, loaded it with equipment and became legendary as one of the first Western ophthalmologists to go to India to train in-country ophthalmic professionals in the use of current techniques.

In the 1990s he was a key player in the creation of Aravind Eye Care System's Aurolab, which reduced the cost of intraocular lenses from over \$300 to less than \$3. He developed an innovative surgical technique (manual sutureless cataract surgery) which became a global standard technique for decades. Nearly every year, and often twice a year throughout his practice career, Marty has been invited to visit eye programs to train, from the remote regions of Tibet, to the jungles of Madagascar.

Marty's work has been transformative to eye care programs and through them transformative to so many people who are now able to see. He is the embodiment of "Seva" or selfless service and an inspiration to us all.

This past January, I was privileged to volunteer and accompany my daughter, Katie Judson, Seva Canada's program co-director, and two of her colleagues, Ken Bassett M.D. and Ashley Holm, to document the work that Seva Canada is doing in Cambodia.

Getting to see the Seva Canada and Seva Cambodia teams in action was nothing short of a remarkable experience.

During the visit I was able to witness first-hand the life-changing effects of both cataract surgery and the refractive fittings of glasses for those whose vision

issues had diminished their ability to go about daily activities. The people served ran the gamut from those in their eighties to those who were eight, from widows trying to care for their family to schoolchildren struggling to learn, and from farmers who could no longer work in the fields to a Buddhist monk who could no longer read from his holy texts. As I witnessed Seva in action, my heart was gladdened by the kindness, caring, and compassion the physicians, technicians, field workers and Seva staff showed to every patient.

The recipients' smiles, words of thanks, and joy at once again being able to see clearly reminded me of why my wife and I support Seva Canada on a monthly basis. EVIDENCE INFORMED PRACTICE PROGRAM



Seva Canada supports eye health institutions to develop programs that work. We've invested heavily in building program partner capacity to collect high-quality clinical and administrative data. Proper analysis of this data provides more efficient and equitable services to the community we serve. Despite these efforts, basic monitoring and evaluation capacity development has been slow in most settings. In an effort to improve monitoring, evaluation and operational research capacity at program partner eye hospitals, Seva has launched the Evidence Informed Practice (EIP) program.

This is all in effort to make your support go further, and bring better vision care, to more people, who really need it.

Started in late 2019, and developed in conjunction with Seva Foundation and the Indian Institute of Public Health—Hyderabad, the EIP program teaches research skills and helps to develop a supportive research environment through leadership investment, data collection and integrity, and research skills development. The program includes seminars, training workshops and mentorship by experts in hospital administration and research methods from the Indian Institute for Public Health.

The EIP program recognizes the central role of hospital leadership in developing eye care programs, establishing high-quality administrative and financial data systems, and using collected data to optimize program performance. In addition, multiple staff within the hospital are trained in research methods and biostatistics, as well as in designing, conducting, analysing and publishing their studies.

To date, four hospitals have published research from their initial studies conducted through the EIP program in peer-reviewed journals. The future of this program will focus on generating administrative data to initiate rapid cycle improvements, and will include new partnerships with expert groups in South Asia and other regions to work side-by-side with eye hospital staff.

READING WITH HIS OWN EYES

I had the privilege of going to Cambodia for the first time in January, it was truly a gift to see the impact you, our generous donors, are making every day in the lives of so many Cambodians. On this trip I met Doung Loum, an 82-year-old senior monk from Banteay Meanchey.

He shared with me that he began having issues with his vision 10 years ago, when he started struggling to read from The Tipitaka, the sacred text of Theravada Buddhism. As his eyesight diminished he had to rely

on the younger monks to guide him around the Wat (a Buddhist monastery) and prepare food for him. As his vision continued to worsen he began to lose hope in ever reading The Tipitaka with his own eyes again.

Last year, Doung Loum was encouraged to visit the community eye screening at the Wat where a Seva field worker was providing eye exams. The field worker referred him to the Eye Unit at the hospital in Banteay Meanchey, where he was diagnosed with bilateral cataract. That day he received his first life-changing surgery.

When I met him, he had come back to the hospital to receive surgery for his second eye, and he could hardly

contain his joy in getting his eyesight fully restored. As his eye patch was removed he exclaimed "It is like the angel has come to save me and now I can see again!" He was so overjoyed he invited us to the Wat to hear him read aloud from The Tipitaka. I can still hear the joy in his voice as he read to us.

KILIMANJARO CENTRE FOR COMMUNITY OPHTHALMOLOGY TEAM

During the celebrations of World Sight Day 2023, the Kilimanjaro Centre for Community Ophthalmology (KCCO), Seva's partner in Africa, received a prestigious award from the Tanzanian Ministry of Health in recognition of its role as a champion for eye health in the country. KCCO supports comprehensive eye health and trachoma elimination programs in 11 of the 31 regions in the country. In 2023, 139,320 people, mostly from rural areas, had their eyes examined and those with an eye condition were offered treatment, either at a subsidized price or free of charge for people too poor to pay. Through the support of KCCO and its long-time partners like Seva Canada, 7129 cataract surgeries (53% of all surgeries benefitted women) were performed in 2023.

Hugh and Gloria Sutcliffe are long-time, devoted Seva supporters, and have even travelled to visit Seva's programs. "Having had the opportunity to see what Seva does firsthand—If you're with someone who has been blind for a long time, and then they have a \$50 operation and they can see again, it's a miracle—an absolute miracle," says Hugh.

Gloria added: "People have stopped living, cooking, leaving their homes, or caring for their grandkids. They've been hidden away. Seva Canada helps them regain life, not just sight. It's really touching to see this all happen, and to see their family's eyes light up too. It's pretty special."

Hugh and Gloria have always been inspired by the creative ways that volunteers raise awareness and funds for Seva Canada. As they started their retirement and moved to a new home on the beach in Parksville, BC, they thought about how much they'd like to spread the word about Seva Canada, while also getting to know their new neighbours.

Everything came together perfectly when their friend, renowned artist Ranjan Sen, mentioned he hadn't had the chance to have an art show in some time because of the COVID-19 pandemic. Ranjan and his wife Rachel

love bringing people together to enjoy Ranjan's unique watercolour and oil paintings; Hugh and Gloria's new home would be the perfect venue.

Ranjan—whose connection to Seva Canada goes all the way back to the 1980s—decided to donate a beautiful watercolour as a door prize to encourage people to come, learn about Seva Canada, and enjoy an inspiring afternoon. "I couldn't be a painter without having eyesight and vision! It's of primary importance" said Ranjan. "In the 80s (artists) John Woodcock and Toni Onley talked to me about Seva and how I should be an active participant. I hope my painting inspires people to donate."



Long-time Seva Canada donor, Rocque Goh is inviting you to join him in providing essential eye care services to Nepalis living in remote, rural and underserved areas of the country.

Together, we're fundraising to provide care to Nepalis in underserved areas of the country, including establishing a permanent Community Eye Centre (CEC) in Talkot region of far-west Nepal.



Staffed by an Ophthalmic Assistant, a CEC is similar to an optometrist's office in Canada where patients can receive treatment for 90% of eye conditions, get medicine, glasses, and referrals to the eye hospital for further care including surgeries.

Rocque agreed to be the lead donor, providing \$10,000 of the initial funding but we still need \$25,000 to support training, equipment, outreach, and care including eye exams, glasses and medicine for people who can access the Talkot CEC and for Nepalis in other underserved areas.
